

Plant of The Month March 2024: Ozark witch hazel/Hamamelis vernalis

Is your garden crying out for February colour? Do the early pollinators seek nourishment? Is there fragrance and graceful form, along with bloom from top to toe in late winter in your garden? If not, Hamamelis *vernalis* (Ozark witch hazel) is the plant for you!

## **DETAILS**:

## Growing Conditions:

Sun: full to part shade Water: medium Maintenance: low Tolerates: deer, erosion, clay soil Zone: 4-8

## Description / Characteristics:

Height x Spread: 1.8m-3m x 2.40m – 4.5m
Bloom time and description: January-April, showy, fragrant yellow with red inner calyx, good fall colour
Fruit: non-showy dehiscent capsule which splits in Sept.-Oct.
Attracts: birds

**Pests & Disease:** food for caterpillars, Japanese beetles, aphids, scale, leafroller & leaf miner, occasional powdery mildew & occasional leaf spots & rot – seldom anything serious, rarely requires chemical control

Propagation: spreads by runners, which are easily removed

Special value: early pollinators, overwintering honeybees

*Toxicity*: n/a **Common Names**: Ozark witch-hazel, Vernal witch-hazel, Winter bloom **Origin**: southern and central U.S.A.
